Eight new Blue Heritage Plaques produced


The Timaru Civic Trust have teamed up with the South Canterbury Historical Society to produce eight new blue heritage plaques to be installed onto heritage buildings around the wider South Canterbury district.

The plaques produced will be installed on the following buildings in the coming months:

- 1 Eleanor Tripp Memorial Library, Woodbury
- 2. Pleasant Point Railway Station

- 3. St Mary's Church, Esk Valley
- 4. St David's Church, Cave
- 5. The Vicarage, Geraldine
- 6 St Patrick's Basilica, Waimate
- 7. Temuka Courthouse Museum
- 8. St Augustine's Church, Waimate

We also wish to acknowledge Heritage New Zealand Pouhere Taonga, who's funding from a local bequest helped make this project possible.




New Urban Art project unveiled

Urban Artist Koryu Aoshima was recently commissioned to create a concept for a mural for the the Orari Buildings, at the north end of Stafford St. The project was a collaboration between the Timaru Civic Trust, Alive Vibrant Timaru and the current owners of the building, the Wilson family.

The building, that has been recently renamed 'Manawa Ora' ('breath of life'), showcases this beautiful and highly visible piece of urban art on two south facing walls - depicting our proximity to the Aoraki/Mt Cook and the land connected to the sea and its' abundance.

"I expressed the breath of life with a girl playing in nature. Nature breathes as we breathe. We need to pass on this will to the next generation, just like the spreading seeds of dandelions." (Koryu Aoshima) Bringing Urban Art into our town centre is an ongoing project for the Civic Trust and placing these murals on side or rear walls of inner city buildings helps to enliven the streetscape. It is a very rewarding and worthwhile initiative, which we are keen to continue supporting. Keep an eye out for more urban art projects to be progressed in the next few months.



Bay Spray workshop

Our partnership with Alive Vibrant Timaru also enables us to contribute to urban events, such as the recent 'Bay Spray' workshop, held on an extremely hot Saturday in February.

This urban art workshop allowed the public to get 'hands on', creating their own personal stencil art or spray painting artworks on the side of our Street Art shipping container. It was hosted by Alive Vibrant Timaru as part of the annual Seaside Festival in collaboration with the Aigantighe Art Gallery and Wuhoo Timaru.
